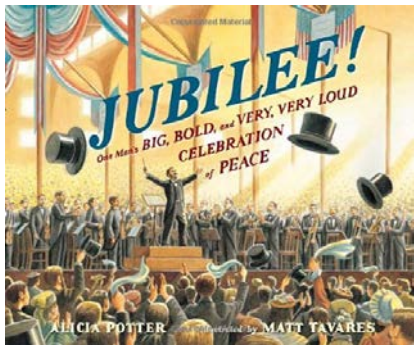

Also meet Jane Addams, represented by storyteller **Suzanne Crandall**. Ms Addams graduated from Rockford College in 1881, and founded and sustained the world famous social settlement Hull-House. She built her reputation as the country’s most prominent woman through her writing, settlement work, and international efforts for peace. She was the first American woman to be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.
